### **Summary of parent views.**

Over 80% of responses do not support us with aims and objectives for RSE.

Over 50% don't think we should be teaching about families and their responsibilities for children until at least upper KS2 / secondary school.

Over 50% don't think we should teach about puberty at primary school.

43% don't think we should be teaching about building confidence to keep safe and ask for help until year 6 / secondary school.

Over 50% don't think we should prepare children for puberty at primary school.

76% don't think we should teach about how a baby is made and develops at primary school – (This would be the sex education part of RSE)

90% don't think we should deliver sex education at our school.
